Despite this disruption, the City of Texas City was able to complete 166.67% of the demolition activities that were expected. The City also was able to assist 53 families with emergency rental assistance through the CDBG-CV funds during PY 2020.

If the City is contacted by anyone of this population they are connected with other resources.

The City of Texas City currently has no specific objectives when it comes to addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons in the city. The City will continue to work with other agencies and organizations to ensure that people of this population in need are served.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City was able to help 53 low-mod income families avoid becoming homeless through its emergency rental assistance program. Of those 53 families, 36 were extremely low-income and most were receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City continues to connect this population with other local resources to make the transition.

#### Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The CDBG Program Coordinator worked with the Deputy Executive Director of the Texas City Housing Authority to include the needs of public housing in the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan and 2020 Action Plan. As a result, exterior repairs will be done on 25 public housing units during PY 2021.
